The main benefit is convenience — no in-person pickup. Some promotions cover shipping, while others may ask for a small shipping fee. Keep in mind that “free” almost always means a limited supply (usually 5–10 days), not months’ worth of lenses.

## Free Trial Contact Lenses for Astigmatism

If you have astigmatism (like I do), you’ll need toric lenses, which cost more and are trickier to fit. That’s why *free trial contact lenses for astigmatism by mail* are worth looking into — they let you confirm comfort and stability before committing to a full purchase.

Astigmatism means your eyes are more football-shaped instead of baseball-shaped. So those lenses need to sort of change your vision vertically. Toric contact lenses to correct astigmatism have small weights in the bottom so that the lenses line up correctly on your eye.

Look for these specifics:

- **Brand variety** – Not all companies offer free toric trials.
- **Cylinder and axis options** – Trials should match your exact prescription.
- **Return or swap policies** – Some promotions let you try a second brand if the first doesn’t work out.

- **Use clean, dry hands** when inserting or removing lenses.
